

# Arrangements

Arrangements for interment can be made any time by contacting the Church office. You are also welcome to make a reservation for the future.

There will be no markers in the Garden. Each person's name, date of birth, and date of death will be inscribed on a bronze scroll which will be mounted on the wall of the Chapel between the two stained glass windows.

When an individual is interred in the Garden, we encourage families to name the Garden as one of the preferred places for memorial donations.

It is appropriate to make a donation to the Garden even if you are not planning to use the Garden as a place of interment. The Garden requires continual care and donations for this purpose are much appreciated.



We request a minimum contribution of one thousand dollars per person for interment in the Garden, plus the cost of the bronze scroll at the time of interment.

# Memorial Garden



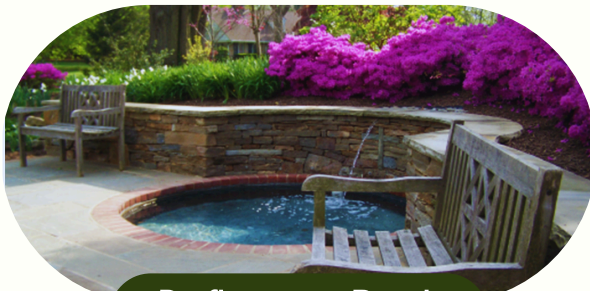
For prayer and

## Designer & Builder

Mr. Jerry Evans, a landscape architect and member of the Church of the Advent, offered his services to design a Memorial Garden that represents our journey through life. He carefully selected the particular trees and plants that comprise the master plan that were then approved by the Church vestry.



## Reflection Pool

Within the retaining wall above the pool is a cross made of lighter stone that is readily apparent when viewed in the reflecting pool.

The Memorial Garden was created in 2002 for the interment of the cremated remains of the parishioners of the Episcopal Church of the Advent and their immediate family members.

The Garden can be found adjacent to the Church and Chapel on the west side.



The quiet, pastoral setting and natural materials with thoughtful plantings contribute to making the Memorial Garden a place of contemplation, reflection, and rest.



## Winding Path

Mr. Evans' plan created a winding path that represents the different challenges in life and ultimately leads one to the quiet, peaceful reflecting pool. A stone wall creates a border and sets the interment area apart from the rest of the Garden.



Mr. Michael Robinson, a member of the Church of the Advent and the contractor, spent many hours matching stone to create the wall and the reflecting pool.
